OPTIONAL EXCURSION DAY

Paper from the Veluwe, the historic region of water-powered paper mills

This excursion introduces the Veluwe, the region renowned for its Dutch paper produced in water mills. It starts with a guided tour of CODA in Apeldoorn, where a museum, library, archive, and makerspace are combined to a vibrant cultural centre. CODA also contains numerous archives from Veluwe paper manufacturers, including the Edo Gerhard Loeber paper collection.

Lunch will be served at CODA Cafe. A bus transfer will take participants to the historic paper mill De Middelste Molen (Loenen), where traditional papermaking techniques can still be experienced. The day concludes with coffee and tea at CODA.
