

THE UNION'S EXTERNAL ACTION

Articles 2 and 3 TEU (guiding values and principles)

Union to « uphold and promote is values and interests... ». It shall contribute to peace, security [...] as well as to the strict observance and the development of international law, including respect for the principles of the UN Charter »

Article 21 TEU (objectives)

- [...] (b) consolidate and support democracy, the rule of law, human rights and the principles of international law;
 - (c) preserve peace, prevent conflicts and strengthen international security...
 - [...]
- (h) promote an international system based on stronger multilateral cooperation and good global governance.

CFSP

A wide scope:


 Article 24(1) TEU: The Union's competence in matters of common foreign and security policy shall cover all areas of foreign policy and all questions relating to the Union's security, including the progressive framing of a common defence policy that might lead to a common defence.[...]

CSDP as part of CFSP

• Article 42(1) TEU:

The common security and defence policy shall be an integral part of the common foreign and security policy. It shall provide the Union with an operational capacity drawing on civilian and military assets. The Union may use them on missions outside the Union for peace-keeping, conflict prevention and strengthening international security in accordance with the principles of the United Nations Charter. The performance of these tasks shall be undertaken using capabilities provided by the Member States.

CFSP's distinctive governance features



CFSP distinctive governance features

- The ToL for the first time qualifies the CFSP as a « competence of the EU » (Art. 24(1) TEU and Art. 2(4) TFEU).
- The nature of the competence however remains unclear. CFSP is not mentioned in Articles 3-6 TFEU. But one could qualify it as a suis generis competence, as MS retain the right to take foreign policy action even if the EU has acted, subject to the principle of loyalty (Art. 24(3) TEU).
- Intergouvernemental or supranational? CFSP is not intergovernmental cf. constructive abstention and possibilities to act by QMV (Art. 31(2) TEU)

The Member States

Article 24(3) TEU (**loyalty**)

MS shall **support** the Union's external and security policy **actively and unreservedly in a spirit of loyalty and mutual solidarity** and shall **comply** with the Union's action in this area. They shall **refrain from any action** which is contrary to the interests of the Union or likely to impair its effectiveness.

Article 32 TEU (inform and consult each other)

MS shall inform and consult one another within the European Council and Council [...] on any matter of foreign and security policy of general interest.

Article 34 TEU (coordination)

Member States shall **coordinate their action** in international organisations and conferences and **uphold** the Union position in such forums.


