

Shaping conditions for recovery: a narrative on a homeless man with severe mental illness in a modern welfare state

Abstract

The shaping of conditions to enable recovery at the intersection of severe mental illness and homelessness remains challenging. Therefore, the local public health services in a city were enriched with a specialized team (S-team). An ethnographic policy evaluation was conducted to identify the essentials. This paper uses the narrative of a homeless man who experiences psychoses for an in-depth analysis. The voices uncover the power dynamics in careseeker – caregiver interactions. The results expose the ‘what’ and ‘how’ of the S-team’s approach, showing how the approach resulted in dynamic collaborative networks. System skills allowed to develop robust, integrative strategies and shape conditions for recovery. The results were evaluated in the light of human rights and show how metaphors can contribute to network learning. In all, this in-depth analysis illustrates how ‘golden socio-ecological system rules’ can contribute to transformative change and promote recovery in marginalized populations with interdependent needs.
